Dear Senator Portman:

As July 24—my final day as Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA)—nears, I thank you for all of your help and assistance during the past 3 years. I am grateful for the support you have given to the men and women of DIA in this challenging national security environment and the trust you continue to place in DIA.

With your help during these past 3 years, the men and women of DIA have worked tirelessly to ensure DIA is better positioned to meet the ever-changing requirements of national policymakers, combatant commanders, and the warfighter. We have directed DIA's efforts toward the greatest national security challenges confronting the United States, including Afghanistan-Pakistan, Iraq, Iran, and transnational terrorism. We are sharpening DIA's efforts to prevent strategic surprise elsewhere around the globe while reinforcing and strengthening DIA's ability to surge in support of contingency operations and crises. 
