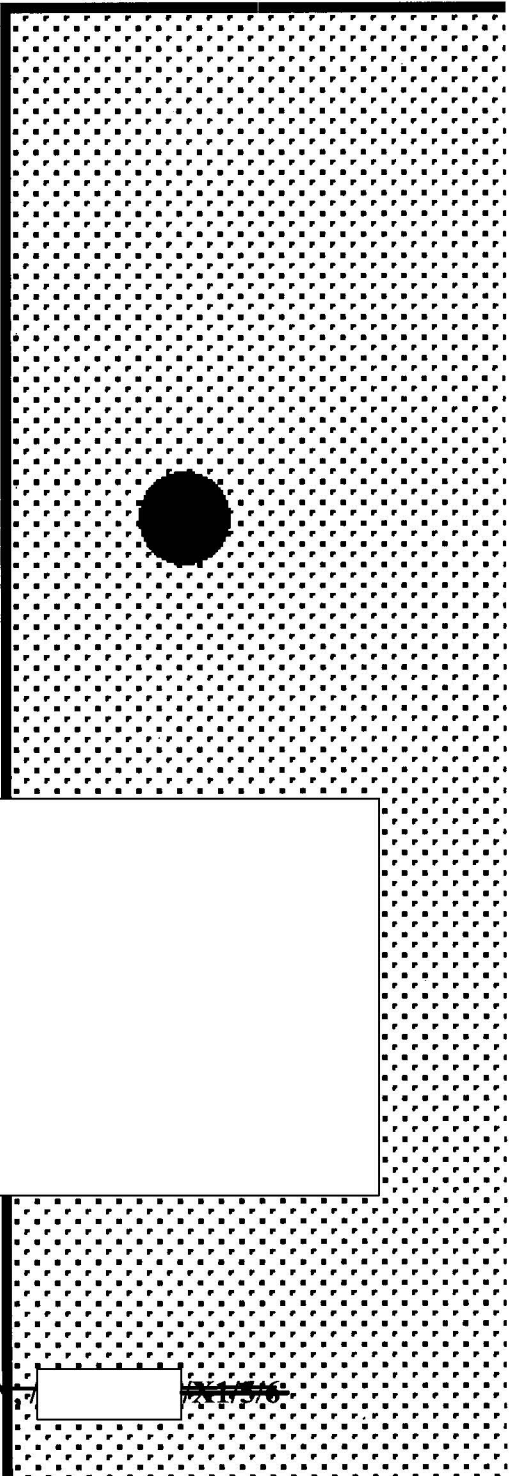

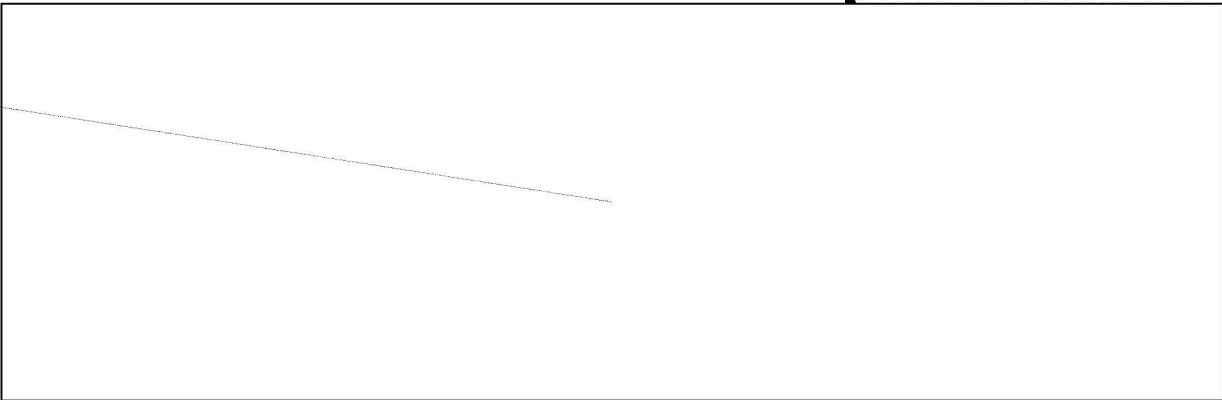

(b)(3):10 USC 424 (S) Recent press reporting illustrates that there has been a steady decline in militant-initiated violence against all civilian and military targets during the past three weeks. (b)(1),1.4 (c)

(b)(3):10 USC 424 (S) This week's violence within the Kashmir Valley has continued at a fairly steady rate of two or three incidents per day, according to press reports. Most of the reporting during 31 May-6 June involved engagements with Indian military, paramilitary and local Special Police forces who were engaged in counter-insurgency sweep and counter-terrorism operations.
